The Children's Services Program focuses on providing support services and programming to pregnant women, families (mom, dads, primary caregivers) and their children 0-6 years of age. The program supports Anishinaabe approaches and knowledge with Elder and First Nation community supports and partners.

Prenatal, postnatal, and neo-natal care is available to all band members living in Wikwemikong, to meet their health care needs. Prenatal care is offered weekly.

CPNP/FASD: To help support healthy nutrition of prenatal clients; and to provide education with a holistic approach for healthy development of infant pre and post-natal. Also, to educate community and prenatal clients on FASD with the intent to prevent FASD in our community.

MCH: Offer one-on-one support and early interventions to promote healthy child and family development to parents and caregivers. Deliver informational programs to families and their children like; nutrition, physical health, child development, dental information, etc. Offer one-on-one support through home and office visiting. Also provide programs for fathers and promote their important role within the family.

HBHC: To help children get a healthy start in life. The program does this by helping parents and children up to age six and their families through home visiting and programming.

Program Description

The goal of the community Health Primary Care Program is to improve overall health status and empower community members to take responsibility and take an active role in improving their health. Mandatory programs are delivered by health promotion, prevention, health protection and health maintenance.

Aboriginal Diabetes Initiative- Delivery of community-based services and activities to reduce the rate of chronic diseases such as type-2 diabetes. Focus is placed on addressing healthy eating, food security, physical activity and obesity. These activities aim to increase awareness and knowledge of risk factors and approaches to diabetes prevention, and provide access to health promotion initiatives targeted at diabetes prevention, screening, and management.

Community Health Promotion- To offer a broad range of community-based activities that enhances health and well-being of community members. Focus on health promotion and injury/ illness prevention and include such programs as child health,

school health, adult health and elder health using population health approach.

Since its inception in 1984, Debajehmujig has aimed to provide a community based platform and showcase for the development of Anishnabek artists of all disciplines. Moving into a donated General and Grocery Store in 2007 that we all knew as "Mastins", the space was rebuilt to accommodate a variety of creation platforms. Today the Creation Centre houses a 2520 Sq. ft, 70' X 36' Black Box Studio with overhead video and audio control booth, an audio production /edit / recording studio, animation and media creation lab, video editing suite lab, professional printing suite, green room, and full kitchen. Our animators are fully trained and work year round in and out of our building, often in schools, writing and performing productions. The Global Savages have visited many parts of Europe on tour and have left our mark as a strong cultured and vibrant community, proud and progressive, just as our title proceeds to read us as.

Our music department has grown immensely and we are pleased with our huge undertaking this summer, in partnership with Wikwemikong Tourism, with the inaugural launch of the 'Wiikwemikoong Arts and Music Festival' (WAMF) held on August 31st and September 1st, Thunderbird Park, Wiikwemkoong. The event brought to the main stage talent from community and abroad; all of whom are First Nation musicians.

The main goal of the music event was to 'revive' the music festival scene in the community; bringing back the essence of expressive creation that our community has long showed avid participation and professional interests in.

Headlining the event on Saturday night, was Juno Award winner, accomplished visual artist, published novelist 'throat singer extraordinaire' Tanya Tagaq. Also headlining that evening was Wiikwemkoong's own recording artist, Juno Award winner Crystal Shawanda. And as usual, she 'wowed' the audience with her explosive energy and vibrance as she hit all the right tunes in her blues rhythms and ballads. Crystal has made great headways as a spokesperson for Indigenous women. Wiikwemkoong is proud of Crystal and share continued appreciation fow what she continues to give back to all of our community.

The Wikwemikong Development Commission (WDC) is a non-profit corporation that is incorporated without share capital under the laws of Ontario and is managed by an elected Board of Directors. Board members are elected by the on-reserve membership at the Annual General Assembly. In 2009 WDC received its Anishinaabe Nooswin, Enaadmaagehjik, meaning "People Helping People."

As the economic development branch of the Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory, the WDC is mandated to develop the natural and human resources of the Territory thereby enhancing the socio-economic conditions and quality of life for all Wiikwemkoong Band members. WDC strives to meet its mandate through its various organizational branches, including Wii Ni Nguch-tood Labour Market Services, which implements training programs to meet band members' employment and training needs; Your Dollar Store with More; Rainbow Ridge Golf Course; FirstTel; Wikwemikong Tourism; and Energy Planning.

One of the newest WDC initiatives is the Wiikwemkoong Foodshare Program which was created for the community to promote food sovereignty through various workshops. The program will include the creation of a village and rural community garden as well as raised garden beds. The distribution of food grown will follow a one-third share model: 1/3 to the landowner, 1/3 to volunteers, and 1/3 to community organizations/events. The Wiikwemkoong Department of Lands and Natural Resources is responsible for all matters related to land & natural resources management and the protection of our waters for the Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory and its larger unsurrendered territories within the Great Lakes.

The department is currently comprised of various program areas, they include:

- Land Management- Regional Land & Environment Management Program (RLEMP)
- Land Technical Services (Survey Assistance, Geographic Information System)
- Species at Risk/Environment
- Forestry (On Reserve Forest Management & Crown Land-Sustainable Forest Licence)
- Oil & Gas
- Industry/Government/Community Engagement
- Natural Resources Opportunities (Industry/ Government Contracts)
- Technical support towards the Islands Claim

At the present time the department is going through a transition of its current land and natural resources management authority under INAC's land regime of RLEMP towards assuming total control over lands and resources by enacting the A'ki Naaknigewin (Land Law). By conducting this, Wiikwemkoong will be able to allot, record, register and transfer properties without INAC's involvement.

The WIIKWEMKOONG Home Care Program mission is to deliver culturally appropriate wholistic community based short and long term optimal in-home and/or community care services to community members of any age who have been assessed. Services include Nursing, Personal support, Occupational Therapy, Physio Therapy, Helpline, Meals on Wheels, Adult day, Generic Transportation and Home Maintenance.

Some services have specific age requirements, formal assessments and user fees. In addition, the home care program also works alongside the Noojmowin-Teg Health Centre's aging at home navigator, home visiting physician, geriatric social worker, aging at home van, dietician, diabetes program, respite care and assistive living. Other external links include Behavioral Supports On (BSO), Senior Mental Health, Victoria Order of Nurses (VON), NELHIN Home and community care (formally CCAC) for Speech and Language and Nurse Practitioner Palliative Care. 

Wikwemikong Tourism Has Banner Year Hosting Cruise Ships, Motor Coach Tours and Travellers from Around the World.

Tourism is on the rise on Manitoulin Island thanks, in part, for the efforts of Wikwemikong Tourism and its marketing initiatives. 2018 Wikwemikong Tourism took part in two major tradeshows; the Outdoor Adventure Show and Rendezvous Canada. Television commercials also aired on WildTV in partnership with Fuel the Fire TV for the Canadian market. In June of this year we officially launched the community website www.wiikwemkoong.ca in collaboration with Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory band administration. The website is a user-friendly platform compatible with both PC and mobile applications.



We also hosted two major industry media: Destination Canada and Indigenous Tourism Association of Canada (ITAC). During the Wiikwemkoong 58th Annual Cultural Festival (August 4th-6th), we hosted Destination Canada in the filming of "Vacations of the Brave" which will air on Amazon Prime in 2019. Ogimaa Duke Peltier hosted the crew and was instrumental in sharing the unique history of Wiikwem-

koong. The Indigenous Tourism Association of Canada visited in July taking part in several cultural experiences while visiting some of our tourism assets.

Through these efforts, we have made strides in establishing a presence in both domestic and international markets.



It was a great season for our group tours and cruise presentations this year, and its not over yet!

Our latest stats show that in the second week of September, cruise tours saw 1710 guests from all over the United States, namely Florida, Boston, Chicago, and Tennessee, just to name a few. Most of our cruise ship guests were/are seniors (some over 90 years old) with a few teenagers on vacation with their grandparents. In collaboration with Lakeshore Excursions we provided cultural tours for 16 visits by the Victory Cruise Lines. Our itinerary included stops in M'Chigeeng and Little Current with us sharing teachings of our sacred medicines - how we use those medicinally and spiritually: i.e. offering prayers and thanks, detoxifying, protection and smudging. We also worked with Rolling Thunder Dance Traditions to present a song and dance performance, again sharing our Anishnaabek teachings, values, and stories. Guests often comment how grateful they are for the experience; how this one activity is one of the most anticipated on their 14day cruise and how impressed they are with the information shared. Wikwemikong Tourism is working closely with partners to develop itineraries that will include visits to Wiikwemkoong in the future to showcase the vibrant culture and history.



Our group tours hosted four schools (one coming on two different dates), one community group and one tour company (three dates), for a combined total of eleven days, with three hundred thirty-five (335) attendees. The focus of our Reconciliation Tours with the school groups aims to educate our visitors on Anishinabek culture through history and cultural teachings with local knowledge keepers. Our Unceded Journey Tour is a perfect platform for students to be engaged in the history of Odawa Mnis while learning of the impacts of colonialism and residential schools as well as the journey towards cultural reclamation. We invite our local schools to take part in a memorable educational experience for all grades. We customize itineraries to suit age range, interests and timeframes.

Our Motor Coach tours attracted visitors mostly from the Greater Toronto Area and Southern Ontario in general. Our group tours range from single to multi-day tours and engage a range of guests from 10 years old to over 90 years old. Our itineraries included our guided hikes, Anishinabek storytelling/ teachings, historical tours, painting experiences, drum & song teachings and also show them the beauty that Odawa Mnis is known for by travelling to Bridal Veil Falls, shopping Lillian's Crafts and visiting the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation's museum and gift shop. It is very rewarding to share who we are as Anishinabek, what is important to us and how we still practice our traditions today. We have found that it's the conversations outside of our presentations that we have with guests that seem to be the most profound. At the time of writing this article (*mid-September*) we still have two school groups booked for this fall (*three and four-day tours respectively*), plus a three-day familiarization tour, one group tour and four cruise dates. So far in total, we have hosted two thousand and forty-five guests (2,045) to Odawa Mnis and Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory via group/cruise tours alone! That's an increase of 1005% (!!) from last year, with a month and a half remaining (as at time article was written).



In addition to hosting our group visitors, we also take pride in our tour guides who deliver our experiences - nurturing them as young knowledge keepers, mentored by Wiikwemkoong Anishnaabek. A special acknowledgement goes out to tour guide Noah Manitowabi, who has been learning and working with Wikwemikong Tourism for two summers. Noah continues to develop his knowledge and skills and will be working with us throughout the season and into 2019. We also want to acknowledge our dedicated team of Tourism Ambassadors who worked hard all summer learning and sharing their knowledge of our beautiful territory.

Wikwemikong Tourism maintains partnership with Killarney Sportsman's Inn

For the second year, Wikwemikong Tourism partnered with Killarney Sportsman's Inn Dock Shop where they designated retail space for Wiikwemkoong artisans. We posted public call-outs for inventory and received work from twelve local artists ranging from paintings, beadwork, birch bark art, crafts, jewellery and leatherwork. All items in the Dock Shop are authentic, hand-made and original pieces. We are very proud of the artistry that Anishnaabek people carry. Honouring our artists by providing them a space to sell their work is important to us. With room for growth at both of our retail locations (Tourist Information Centre in Wiikemkoong, and Sportsman's Inn in Killarney) we invite all interested artisans, crafters and original works to be included in our retail spaces.

Cultural Interpretation with Wikwemikong Tourism Onboard the Chi-Cheemaun

During the months of June, July and August, Wikwemikong Tourism, in conjunction with the M.S. Chi-Cheemaun, held *Cultural Interpretation Workshops* for passengers of the

Chi-Cheemaun travelling between Manitoulin Island and Tobermory. The partnership began in early May between Wikwemikong Tourism and the Owen Sound Transportation Company (OSTC) as they were in search of facilitators that would offer teachings of the Anishinabek from Odawa Mnis to its passengers. The staff of Wikwemikong Tourism jumped at the opportunity to extend their programming outside of the territory and on the waters of Lake Huron.

Starting June 27th to August 29th, three different workshops would rotate every week that engaged the senses of the passengers of the Chi-Cheemaun.

<u>Dewegan – Drum and Song:</u> This intimate experience taught Anishinabek songs and drum teachings.

<u>Unceded Journey:</u> Through our Unceded Journey Tour experience, the history of Odawa Mnis (Manitoulin Island), and Wiikwemkoong was shared (Wiikwemkoong - Canada's only officially recognized Unceded Territory).

The Seven Grandfathers – Painting Experience: An immersion of one's self in a cultural activity guided by the Seven Grandfather Teachings.

Looking back to this season, Wikwemikong tourism staff boarded the Chi-Cheemaun for the 1:30 p.m. sailing to Tobermory and set up in the children's area. As curious passengers look on, Wikwemikong tourism staff and ambassadors would invite people to participate in the up-coming workshop. These

sessions would not only provide education from the Anishinaabe perspective, but also serve as on-board entertainment for the 1 hour and 45 minute ride to and from the island. The Unceded Journey workshop supplied a lecture alongside a Power Point presentation that was conducted by Mitchell Manitowabi. The presentation fascinated all participants as they learned of the original occupied lands - not only the Three Fires Confederacy but all Nations of Turtle Island (North America). This was followed by the creation of the 1836 Bondhead Treaty that the Odawa Chiefs and Lieutenant Governor Francis Bondhead conceived. Not long after, the 1862 McDougall Treaty was introduced but rejected by the Wiikwemkoong Chiefs and thus gave us the title of "Unceded Territory".

The Dewegan Drum and Song workshop brought a more sensual interaction with the participants as they were treated to songs of the Anishinabek. Listening to the heart beat of Mother Earth and voice of our people delighted the passengers as many have never been to a pow wow. The dewegan offered a little taste of those gatherings the Anishinabek and other nations forgather.

The Seven Grandfathers - Painting Experience, presented by David 'Sunny' Osawabine, allowed the children to paint to their hearts desire - all while Sunny delivered the Seven Grandfather Values. These values have been passed on from our ancestors for generations and offer a glimpse of our past traditions.

A developed partnership with De-

bajehmujig introduced a new experience to the Chi-Cheemaun and the newest recruits of arts animators brought stories of Nanabush aboard for an excited audience. The stories were soon followed up by an improv performance that had the passengers filling the room with laughter.

Wikwemikong Tourism would like to thank the Owen Sound Transportation Company, riders of the M.S. Chi-Cheemaun, (both visitors and returnees of Manitoulin Island) that enjoyed and engaged their senses through our workshops. This was just a small part of the many operations Wikwemikong Tourism has been conducting through the Summer Season of 2018.

Trail Development Services



This season our 'trail development services' (TDS) crew was busy building hiking trails in Rama, Blind River and Wiikwemkoong. The crew started their season building boardwalks and bridges at the Black River Park in Rama. This trail, when completed, will include a medicine trail with interpretive signage and will complement the Black River Campground. The remainder of the summer season had our crew building 1.9km of hiking trail in Blind River. This project was in collaboration with the Mississauga First Nation, Trans Canada Trail and the Town of Blind River. Lastly our crew has been working on boardwalks, bridges and reopening the fitness trail at the Bebamikawe Memorial Trail. The TDS team will be closing out the season completing a section of trail at Serpent River. The crew reminds people to keep an eye out for the first edition of the "Men of Trails" Calendar in support of local trail projects.

Point Grondine Park



It has been another great season for users to the Point Grondine Park. The season is not quite over but we expect between a 10-15% growth from the 2017 season. The Parry Sound fire did not affect the Park to the point of closure but we did experience some days of heavy smoke.

Our park staff were in constant communication with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) and Ontario Parks on the progress of the fire. We are thankful of the great work that the fire fighters did in containing this large fire.

The park opened the new coastal campsites along the southern coast of Point Grondine which are now ready for kayakers and canoers. Three new campsites along the southern coast are located in the sheltered coves of the chickens going east to Kaa Gaa Gehns Bay.

This summer we also partnered with the Youth Center and the Outdoor Adventure Leadership Experience (OALE) to lead a group into a multi-day trip into the interior of the Park. Trail Guardian Winona Ominika assisted in leading the group through the Park and into Collins Inlet on route to Odawa Mnis. This partnership was an excellent opportunity for Wiikwemkoong Youth to become familiar with the interior of the Park.

NEW PROCESS FOR BIRTH REGISTRATION

- Parents must fill out the new forms titled "Application for Registration on the Indian Register and for the Secure Certificate of Indian an Status (SCIS)" (For Children 15 years of age or younger or dependent Adults). Applying for the Secure Certificate of Indian Status Card is optional, you can still complete the new forms for birth registration only.
- Applying Parent (can be the father or mother) must provide 1 piece of government issued photo identification, i.e. Canadian Passport, Ontario Drivers Licence, Ontario Health Card with picture, Valid Certificate of Indian Status Card, Secure Certificate of Indian Status Card, or Ontario Photo Identification Card.
- Parents must still provide the original Long Form Birth Certificate also known as Statement of Live Birth.

You may submit in-person or by mail, if submitting by mail, please contact the Membership office.

PAPER LAMINATE CARDS

The Membership office is currently issuing the paper laminate Certificate of Indian Status Card (CIS). You must have identification when applying, preferably two pieces of identification.

If you only have one (1) piece of identification, it must be a government issued photo identification, i.e. Ontario Health Card, Ontario Driver's Licence, Firearms Licence, Canadian/United States Passport (counts as two ID's), Student I.D. Card or Ontario Photo ID card. Birth Certificate can be used as a secondary piece of ID.

If you do not have two pieces of identification, you must present one piece of government issued identification and the membership office personnel can sign a guarantor form for the second piece of identification. The cost is \$10 for the picture, if you supply your own picture, the cost is \$2.00. The Wiikwemkoong Ontario Works (OW) office has the responsibility of delivering the provincial Ontario Works program, there are two forms of assistance under the Ontario Works program; basic financial assistance and employment assistance.

Basic financial assistance includes income assistance provided for purposes of basic needs and shelter, mandatory and discretionary benefits, and emergency assistance.

Employment assistance includes supports and services aimed at increasing the participant's employability and/or quality of life. This includes education/basic training, life and home skill development, parenting programs, certificate training and on-the-job training opportunities (community placement or employment placement). Many of these

activities are coordinated as a collaborative effort between various community organizations/departments.

In addition to the two core functions identified within the provincial program, the Wiikwemkoong OW office also manages the following programs:

- » Employment Experience: a federally funded wage subsidy program that provides OW participants with on-the-job training and work experience through a paid placement.
- » <u>Informal Child Care:</u> financial assistance to cover informal child care while OW or ODSP participants participate in employment related activities.
- » Homemaking: non-medical services such as light housekeeping, laundry, shopping, and meal preparation to individuals who require assistance with household activities of daily living, and who have limited financial resources.
- » Addiction Services Initiative (ASI): an OW program that is a targeted employment assistance activity designed to help participants whose substance abuse is a barrier to participation in employment and/or employment related activities.
- » Low Income Assistance Program: financial assistance available to low-income individuals and families to support emergency shelter related expenses, such as heat, hydro, and other housing related services, items or costs necessary to establish or maintain the safety or well-being of household member(s), where such supports cannot be provided for through other means.

Wiikwemkoong Ontario Works Events



Mandate

The Wikwemikong Technical Services Advisory Unit began operation in 1990. Under the mandate of Chief and Council, it is to provide advisory and technical support services to the WUIR. From 1990 to 2018 the program has been involved with subdivision developments, water & sewer upgrades, road construction, construction of a new water treatment plant, expanding the existing wastewater treatment, arena upgrades, maintenance management systems for all band owned infrastructure, asset conditioning reporting of existing community O&M funded assets, updating the capital asset inventory and housing inspections.

Key Objectives

The main purpose of the program is to provide professional technical advisory services either through in-house or through liaison with other agencies and/or consultants by providing sound expert advice to make well informed decisions; also to make reference to the updated 20 year Capital Planning Study for future community development improvements as approved by Chief and Council.

The main services that the Technical Services Advisory Unit provides are as follows:

Advisory Services

 Technical Services also provides advisory services when reviewing minor capital projects, plans and specifications reviews, tender contract reviews, maintenance management systems (update or development) developing terms of references for studies and projects.

Minor Capital Projects

Assist WUT in planning, coordinating and implementing minor capital project. Examples of minor capital projects would be electrification (hydro services in rural areas), water/sewer upgrades, road construction, fire protection, housing renovations. These projects would be with a value of \$500,000 or less.

Major Capital Projects

- Assist WUT in planning, coordinating and implementing major capital projects. Examples of major capital projects would be water treatment plant, sewage treatment plant, subdivisions, landfills and buildings of \$500,000 value or greater.
- Work closely and consult regularly with designated professional engineers, consultants, inspection agencies, INAC, Health Canada, Public Works Canada, and other government agencies.

Asset Condition Reporting

- Assist WUIR every 3 years with the planning, coordinating, and physical inspections of on-reserve O&M funded capital assets.
- The asset condition reporting is used to verify the degree in which O&M of such capital assets complies with the terms and conditions of funding arrangements.

Annual update of WUT capital assets using ICAMS (Integrated Capital Asset Management System) in order to access Indigenous Services Canada funding for WUT operations and maintenance (O&M) .

Wiikwemkong Unceded Territory Officially Welcomes Terry McCaffrey, The New Chief of Police of the Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service Through a 'Swearing-In Ceremony' September 18th, 2018.

Various community agency representatives, community members, leadership and high level personnel from other police detachments, were present to be a part of the momentous occasion.

Chief Terry McCaffrey replaces retired Chief of Police, Gary Reid (*Interim was Sergeant Gregory Mishibinijima*).

Chief McCaffrey is an 'experienced' First
Nation policing veteran with over two decades
of service across Canada; having served for
the Dakota Ojibway Police Service in
Manitoba, Blood Tribe Police Service and
Tsuu T'ina Nation Police Service in Alberta.
For the last 10 years, he served with the
Treaty Three Police Service in Kenora, ON.
McCaffrey's policing career began in 1996;
having been trained at the RCMP Training
Academy-Depot in Regina, SK.

His roles in policing have included Front Line Officer, Detective Constable, Hostage and Crisis Negotiator and now...Chief of Police. On a personal note, McCaffrey and his wife Arlene have three beautiful children: Michael-20 years old, Mikayla-13 years old and Kole-9 years old.

During Chief McCaffrey's Swearing-In Ceremony, he provided the following remarks:

I would like to start by saying Miigwetch to the Creator for this beautiful day, Miigwetch to the Elders for sharing their wisdom, Miigwetch to the delegates, officers and the Police Board members in attendance. A big thank you also goes out to all the community members in attendance and all that have welcomed me and my family, with open arms and hearts into the community. Chi Miigwetch!

I must also take this time to thank all the Wikwemikong police officers and civilian staff for welcoming me and supporting me with the onboarding process. You are all excellent at what you do and your strong sense of team is what has made this family strong; with a solid foundation.

Those of us in law enforcement know that no police officer can truly be successful without the support of their family. The hours, the odd shifts, the stress, the missed holidays, birthdays and everything else that goes with this job, takes a huge toll on family life sometimes. I am so fortunate that I have such a great, supportive family. I would like to recognize my family for their love and support throughout all the years. My wife Arlene, who keeps me grounded and assists me with finding compassion in all things - thank you for supporting me through all the years. I am not whole without you. Thank you to my children Michael, Mikayla and Kole for you are all constant reminders of why I serve our community; to keep it a secure and safe place for our children to learn live and grow. A police officer's family is a unique one full of challenges and for that I would like to recognize all of our officers' families for supporting them through their careers because I assure you. without family support, this career would be next to impossible.

When I started my policing career over 23 years ago, I did not envision myself travelling across the country serving in 37 different First Nation communities throughout Alberta. Manitoba, Northwestern Ontario and now here in Wiikwemkoong. I did not envision myself specializing in many policing sectors like Major Crime, Drug Investigation, Hostage and Crisis Negotiation, In Service Training, Professional Standards and Leadership Management. I did not have the vision to see myself rising through the ranks to one day becoming Chief of Police. I was just eager and proud and felt very honoured to be serving our communities. The funny thing is, although my role has changed from my rookie years to now, I am just as eager, proud and honoured to be serving our communities now as I was on my very first day.

Serving as a police officer today means facing adversity and overcoming increasing challenges. We ask more of our officers on the street today than at any time in history. Policing is about much more than simply investigating crime and arresting those who do harm. It is about providing counseling to families in crisis. It is about getting someone

suffering from mental illness medical help, working out a dispute between neighbors and working with youth in various engagement programs.

We require officers to not only be experts in law enforcement but to also have many of the same skills of a trained doctor, mental health provider, lawyer and community organizer. I know that all Wiikwemkoong officers put their uniform on every day because we are chosen and honored to help people and give back to the community that we serve.

We all understand that there are some things that need to be accomplished that are not always easy to do and sometimes the work is not very pleasant or rewarding but we come to work every day. We are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week and we always try to treat people fairly with the dignity and respect they deserve.

Please know that under my command we are going to keep that level of service going and try to find ways to modernize and improve on our service delivery whenever we can. In the days, weeks, months and years ahead, our focus will be to ensure that everyone's personal safety along with our communities public safety is continuously promoted by focusing on community mobilization, engagement, education, crime prevention and enforcement. I will be working with our officers, the police services board and community to develop and execute a community driven strategic plan that addresses our community needs as guided by our shared goals and priorities that will ultimately promote community safety, wellness and health.

To be an effective leader we must grow as things evolve and change and things are changing in our line of work every single day. I would like to make a pledge to our community members: the Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service is committed to working with you to make our community a safe and secure place to live, work and play and that we will always strive to secure and maintain your trust.
